Social scientists study a huge range of subjects including health and wellbeing, education, economics, environmental change, ageing, politics, crime and governance, population change and international development.

#### How we make a difference

We fund research, resources and training that have the maximum impact on people and society.

We help to tackle the biggest challenges society faces through partnerships, new ways of funding research, and involvement with some of the world's most ambitious research programmes. Our research informs policymakers and practitioners, and helps make businesses, voluntary bodies and other organisations more effective.
